

Introduction

It is the Government's plan that all pupils, in all year groups, will return to school full-time from 8 March 2021.

As part of planning for a full return in the autumn term, it is a legal requirement that schools and trusts should revisit and update their risk assessments, to consider additional risks and control measures to enable a return to full capacity. Anthem will ensure that appropriate measures are in place to reduce risks to the lowest reasonably practicable level.


This risk assessment template will set out guidance and measures to support schools in the following areas:

1. Minimise contact with individuals who are required to self-isolate by ensuring they do not attend school
2. Ensure face coverings are used in recommended circumstances
3. Ensure everyone is advised to clean their hands thoroughly and more often than usual
4. Ensure good respiratory hygiene for everyone by promoting the 'catch it, bin it, kill it' approach
5. Maintain enhanced cleaning, including cleaning frequently touched surfaces often, using standard products such as detergents
6. Consider how to minimise contact across site and maintain social distancing wherever possible
7. Keep occupied spaces well ventilated
8. Ensure individuals wear appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE) where necessary
9. Promote and engage in asymptomatic testing, where available
10. Promote and engage with the NHS Test and Trace process
11. Manage and report confirmed cases of coronavirus (Covid-19) amongst the school community
12. Contain any outbreak by following local health protection team advice

<p>Decide the physical and organisational structures needed to limit risks and limit movement around the building(s) (for example, classroom layouts, entry and exit points, staggered starts and break times, class sizes, lunch queues, use of communal staff areas). Agree how safety measures and messages will be implemented and displayed around school.</p>	<p>How to group children: Schools should consider keeping group sizes as small as possible to minimise disruption if a case is confirmed in the school. Whatever the size of the group, they should be kept apart from other groups where possible. Encourage pupils to keep their distance within groups. Try to limit interaction, sharing of rooms and social spaces between groups as much as possible. Primary schools should look to group children in individual classes wherever possible; younger pupils and those with complex needs will not be able to maintain social distancing and it is acceptable for them not to distance within their group. For Secondary schools, the necessity to deliver a broad and balanced curriculum will lead to larger group sizes but these would not be larger than a year group. To aid with separation, consider zoning parts of your school.</p> <p>You may keep pupils in their class groups for most of the classroom time, but also allow mixing in wider groups for specialist teaching, wraparound care and transport.</p> <p>SEN risk assessments: schools must ensure that specific risk assessments are completed for all students who are known to have additional support needs in school. All reasonable steps must be taken to ensure that any risks present are kept to their lowest possible level.</p> <p>Measures within the classroom: whilst it is not always possible to maintain a 2-metre distance, especially when working with KS2 children, staff should consider doing so when circumstances allow it; avoiding close face-to-face contact will help, as will minimising time spent within 1-metre of anyone.</p>	<p>School is operating with each year group being a separate bubble and bubbles with children will not mix.</p> <p>Reception bubble</p> <p>Year 1 bubble</p> <p>Year 2 bubble</p> <p>Year 3 bubble</p> <p>Year 4 bubble</p> <p>Year 5 bubble</p> <p>Year 6 bubble</p> <p>This ensures that correct ratios are adhered to at break times and lunchtimes.</p> <p>Individual risk assessments have been created for all children with EHCPs.</p> <p>For safeguarding or health and safety reason other adults may need to enter classrooms. Ideally this will be a member of SLT who will need to wear a mask.</p> <p>SLT can visit their own phases bubbles to support and or team teach wearing a mask and keeping a distance of 2m.</p>

	<p>Maintain a distance of 2-metres in secondary schools, which is strongly recommended by public health advisors.</p> <p>Classrooms should be configured to support social distancing as much as possible, with desks being arranged so students sit side-by-side, rather than face-to-face or side on, which each desk facing in the direction of the teacher.</p> <p>For KS2 children, they should also be supported to maintain distance and not touch staff and their peers where possible. This will not be possible for the youngest children and some children with complex needs and it is not feasible in some schools where space does not allow. Schools doing this where they can, and even doing this some of the time, will help.</p> <p>Each class should be provided with its own supply of hand sanitiser and disposable disinfectant cloths – students and staff should apply sanitiser when entering a classroom and must wipe down their work area prior to leaving.</p> <p>Measures during music lessons: schools should note that there may be an additional risk of infection in environments where you or others are singing, chanting, playing wind or brass instruments or shouting. This applies even if individuals are at a distance. Schools should consider how to reduce the risk, particularly when pupils are playing instruments or singing in small groups such as in music lessons by, for example, physical distancing and playing outside wherever possible, limiting group sizes to no more than 15, positioning pupils back-to-back or side-to-side, avoiding sharing of instruments, and ensuring good ventilation. Singing, wind and brass playing should not take place in larger groups such as school choirs and ensembles, or school assemblies.</p>	<p>Phase leader can also observe NQT (OB/ NH once each half-term).</p> <p>Head Teacher can visit classes providing she has mask and stand in box for a time less than 10 minutes.</p> <p>In Reception and Year 1 the children will access a play based curriculum. It is envisaged that no session/activity will last longer than 15 minutes.</p> <p>In Years 3 to 6 children desks will face in the direction of the teacher.</p> <p>Where guided group sessions need to happen, children will sit in I and H styled tables with children facing the front.</p> <p>Each classroom will be supplied with hand sanitiser, hand soap, disinfectant cleaner, paper towels.</p> <p>Instrument lessons will start. Pupils will be positioned back-to-back, instruments will not be shared and classrooms will be ventilated.</p>
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	<p>Areas for students withdrawn from classrooms: should a student be asked to leave a lesson for whatever reason (exc. health related incident), identify areas which can safely be used for those asked to leave a lesson; social distancing and enhanced cleaning measures must be maintained in these areas due to students from all year groups potentially accessing it.</p> <p>Windows: where possible, windows should be opened to increase ventilation around all rooms used by staff and pupils. Whilst windows are open in the summer months, consider using fans to assist with maintaining sufficient air circulation.</p> <p>Doors: bearing in mind fire safety and safeguarding requirements, consider propping doors open to aid with ventilation and to limit handle use.</p> <p>Air-conditioning: the risk of air-conditioning spreading the virus is extremely low, therefore certain types of air-conditioning systems can be used, if required. If a system introduces fresh air into a room, then they can be used in all locations. An air-con system which only recirculates air within the same area (i.e. no fresh air is introduced), they can be used but only if they serve one room only; any air-con system of this type serving multiple rooms must not be used unless the recirculation mode can be deactivated.</p> <p>Ventilation systems: where mechanical ventilation is present, recirculatory systems should be adjusted to full fresh air. If this is not possible, systems should be operated as normal. Where possible, occupied room windows should be open. Ventilation to chemical stores should remain operational.</p> <p>If you are unsure what type of systems are in use, please consider seeking guidance from a mechanical engineer.</p>	<p>For health-related incidents, pupils will be asked to go to the office or medical room. Medical room must be wiped down and cleaned after each incident. Office to report each incident to cleaning staff.</p> <p>Windows will be open in the classrooms.</p> <p>There are two classrooms with only tiny windows that can open.</p> <p>Doors will be propped open.</p> <p>N/A</p> <p>Ventilation system will be operated as normal. Annual maintenance was done on 21st July 2020. 4 AHU filters were replaced in November 2020. Another 4 replaced in December 2020.</p>
	<p>Entry and exit points (classrooms): where possible, schools should use doors leading outside in addition to the main door leading in from corridors.</p>	<p>One-way system is in operation to enter and exit the school premises at drop off and collection.</p>

	<p>Entry and exit points (main access): where possible, to avoid busy pinch-points, schools to create entrance only and exit only points into the main building/site at specific times of the day (e.g. morning arrivals and home-time).</p> <p>Corridor and stair usage: there is low risk of contagion though passing people in corridors and stairwells, however, they should only be used for safe rapid-transit from one place to another (e.g. no congregating in corridors).</p> <p>Fire strategy: schools must review their fire evacuation strategy, taking into account the need to maintain social distancing as much as is reasonably possible. A planned evacuation must be completed before the Easter holidays.</p>	<p>We have identified different entry and exit points for collection and drop off times.</p> <p>Throughout the school day, the school operates a one-way system.</p> <p>The school returned to the original fire evacuation strategy but we will ensure that the children will stay within their bubbles. A planned evacuation will take place before Easter Holiday.</p>
	<p>Staggering starts and finish times: schools should consider introducing staggered start times for each year group, ensuring that the start and finish times are at least 15-minutes apart for each year group using the same entrance.</p> <p>Arrangements must be discussed and agreed with your teaching staff and communicated to parents.</p>	<p>A timetable has been arranged for staggered start and finish.</p> <p>SLTs will be mindful at pinching points and place staff at these points to ensure quick transit out.</p> <p>All parents will need to wear masks when dropping or collecting children.</p>
	<p>Lunch and break times: staggering lunch and break times, by groups, will help ensure that social distancing of groups is maintained. If space allows, consider temporarily converting another large space into a second dining area, or arrange for lunches to be taken within each group setting.</p>	<p>Lunch is staggered. All the children in a bubble have lunch at a set time, they stay seated at the table, food is brought to them. The children are not allowed to leave the table and exit at the same time.</p> <p>Staff to be asked to wear masks at lunchtime in dining hall.</p>

		<p>Break times have been staggered and zoned with consistent adults.</p>
	<p>Use of communal staff areas: Schools should also plan how shared staff spaces are set up and used to help staff to distance from each other. Use of staff rooms should be minimised, although staff must still have a break of a reasonable length during the day.</p> <p>Adults must maintain 2-metre distance from each other at all times.</p> <p>You must consider measures to reduce staff members touching/using the same equipment or sharing food – consider providing disposable cups, crockery, etc. and providing disinfectant wipes near tea-making facilities.</p> <p>Nursing mothers: an individual risk assessment should be completed for any staff member wishing to express milk whilst at work.</p>	<p>Maximum number of staff have been set for each staff room (6 for each at one time).</p> <p>Staff lunch times are staggered and staff are expected to adhere to social distancing. Where additional members of staff need to take lunch (student teachers/ interns etc.), they can use the music room.</p> <p>Staff are required to wear masks when they are not teaching. They also required to be disposed of or placed in personal plastic bag and wash hands.</p> <p>All staff have their own cups and crockery, which they then wash up and store in their cubby holes.</p> <p>Staffroom to cleaned twice a day, with cleaning material available for all staff to wipe down.</p> <p>N/A</p>
	<p>Signage, posters and training: posters encouraging social distancing and the importance of maintaining hygiene levels must be displayed around the school. Training must be provided to staff prior to the school reopening.</p>	<p>Signs have been placed strategically around the school with spare signage at hand for any replacement needed.</p> <p>Staff were informed and inducted in July and September.</p> <p>They have been retrained at the end of September and again at the beginning of the new half term.</p> <p>All teacher students to be inducted alongside safeguarding.</p> <p>Office to give risk assessment to all teacher students.</p>

<p>Decide what an enhanced cleaning schedule looks like and how it will be implemented in your school (for example, how often, when/if an additional clean is necessary) and how you will ensure sufficiency of supplies.</p>	<p>All cleaning undertaken must be enhanced. As a minimum, in addition to the normal clean, door handles, desks and other items frequently used by staff and pupils must be wiped using disposable disinfectant cloths.</p> <p>Cleaning schedule (classrooms used by the same children all day): an enhanced clean is only needed at the end of the day. If more than one staff member provides teaching within this setting, they must wipe down their workstation upon arrival and prior to leaving.</p> <p>Cleaning schedule (classrooms used by different children but from within the same group): in addition to an enhanced clean at the end of the day, staff and students should wipe their workstations down with disposable disinfectant wipes before and after using their workstations.</p> <p>Cleaning schedule (classrooms used by different groups): before a new group can use a classroom previously occupied by a different group, an enhanced cleaned must be undertaken.</p> <p>Cleaning schedule (communal areas): For any areas shared by staff or different groups, at least two additional cleans must be completed throughout the day and, if possible, undertaken during break times. In addition to this, the catering team should assist with enhanced cleaning and hygiene levels during lunch service.</p> <p>Cleaning supplies: ensure suppliers are able to honour orders and that good stock levels are maintained at all times. Stocks of hand sanitiser must be stored securely and away from ignition sources. Schools must confirm schedule and specification of clean with cleaning team and staff.</p>	<p>The school will be undertaking an enhanced level of cleaning throughout the day. We have a cleaner on site all day to undertake routine cleaning of toilets and other shared areas. This makes it possible for toilets to be cleaned mid-morning, lunchtime, mid-afternoon and end of day. Cleaners will clean chairs, tables, taps, windows and door handles regularly along with other high contact areas.</p> <p>Spaces used will be cleaned at the end of each day with each cleaner having allocated rooms for the duration. Communal areas such as toilets and stairwells with hand rails will be cleaned during the day in addition to the end of the day. This will be undertaken when no other people are around.</p> <p>Catering staff will be extra vigilant in their cleaning of the kitchen and dining area. In the dining hall after each bubble exits the tables and other surfaces will be wiped down.</p> <p>Staffroom will be cleaned after lunch and at the end of the day. Staff are encouraged to have their own cups, cutlery and plates.</p> <p>Cleaning supplies' stock will be monitored and ordered when required. Hand sanitiser will be stored in sink areas.</p> <p>Cleaning schedules have been confirmed with cleaning staff - a rota of duties with signing off schedule has been created.</p>
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	<p>Toilet access: different groups don't need to be allocated their own toilet blocks, but toilets will need to be cleaned regularly and pupils must be encouraged to clean their hands thoroughly after using the toilet.</p> <p>Respiratory hygiene: ensuring good respiratory hygiene by promoting the 'catch it, bin it, kill it' approach. To provide paper handkerchiefs and lidded waste bins lined with bin bags in key locations (group settings, dining areas, staff rooms, etc.). Lidded bins must be frequently emptied, ensuring that the contents are not touched and that the bin bags are securely fastened prior to disposal.</p> <p>Face coverings (public transport): Face coverings are required at all times on public transport (for children in Year 7 and up).</p> <p>Face coverings (in school): For all staff, visitors, contractors and Year 7 and above pupils, face coverings should be worn when moving around the premises, such as in corridors and communal areas where social distancing cannot easily be maintained (this does not apply when completing a strenuous activity, for example, when partaking in PE lessons). Face coverings should also be worn in classrooms or during activities, unless social distancing can be maintained. Face coverings do not need to be worn by pupils when outdoors on the premises.</p> <p>Safe wearing of face coverings requires the cleaning of hands before and after they are touched, including to remove or put them on. It also requires the safe storage of them in individual, sealable plastic bags between use</p> <p>Some individuals are exempt from wearing face coverings. This applies to those who:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> -cannot put on, wear or remove a face covering because of a physical impairment or disability, illness or mental health difficulties 	<p>Toilets will be cleaned during the day as well as after school.</p> <p>Bins with lids are in most classrooms and communal areas. We have a good supply of tissues with a clear message to children of 'catch it, bin it, kill it' - these bins will be in classrooms and around the school in key locations. All bins will have bin liners and will be cleared and cleaned daily.</p> <p>Children wearing face coverings will remove them on entering the class, using guidelines opposite, and put them either in the bin or their bag/coat (inside a plastic bag).</p> <p>All visitors, including parents, although we will not be expecting or accepting any but essential, will be asked to wash their hands or sanitise before entering school premises. All visitors on sight will be asked to wear a mask.</p> <p>Staff are encouraged to wear face coverings in corridors and other communal areas.</p> <p>Office will be in charge of ensuring all new visitors (e.g. teacher students) understand protocols and be given risk assessment. All new staff will be inducted with this when they receive safeguarding training.</p>
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	<p>-speak to or provide help to someone who relies on lip reading, clear sound or facial expression to communicate</p> <p>In primary schools, face coverings should be worn by staff and visitors when moving around the premises and when social distancing between adults is not possible. Children in primary schools do not need to wear a face covering.</p> <p>Note: Face visors or shields should not be worn as an alternative to face coverings. They may protect against droplet spread but are unlikely to be effective in reducing aerosol transmission when used without an additional face covering</p> <p>Face coverings (disposal and storage): any face coverings used during the school day must either be disposed of in a lidded bin (not recycling bin) at the end of day (if single-use) or removed and placed in a plastic bag and taken home (if reusable). Whilst in use, pupils must be instructed not to touch the front of the face covering during use or when removing them.</p> <p>Where a face covering becomes damp, it should not be worn, and the face covering should be replaced carefully. Staff and pupils may consider bringing a spare face covering to wear if their face covering becomes damp during the day.</p> <p>Handwashing: soap and water or hand sanitiser are considered suitable (paper towels and hand driers are acceptable ways to dry hands). In addition to handwashing after toilet use, to introduce the following hand washing schedule;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Upon arrival • After break times • When changing classrooms • Before and after lunch • Prior to home time 	<p>Handwashing is timetabled. Hand washing will take place on arrival, break times, and lunch time, after coughing etc. and entering the classroom after leaving for whatever reason.</p> <p>All classrooms have a sink area and soap, paper towels and hand sanitiser will be provided at each sink.</p>
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	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • After coughing or sneezing into hands <p>All visitors must be directed to wash their hands or to use hand sanitiser upon arrival.</p> <p>To help facilitate this requirement, each classroom should have its own supply of hand sanitiser and additional hand washing stations should be considered.</p> <p>Schools should also consider supervising handwashing stations during busy periods so that overcrowding of facilities is effectively managed and kept to a minimum.</p> <p>Clothes washing and uniforms: Uniforms and clothing do not need to be cleaned more often than usual, nor do they need to be cleaned using methods which are different from normal. You should consider how pupil non-compliance is managed, taking a mindful and considerate approach in relation to parents who may be experiencing financial pressures.</p> <p>PE lessons: on the days a student is expected to participate in PE, they should wear their PE kit to school and remain wearing it throughout the school day. Tracksuits, sweatshirts, etc. can be worn, if required, to ensure that students remain sufficiently warm and dry throughout the day.</p> <p>Shared items (internal): For individual and very frequently used equipment, such as pencils and pens, it is recommended that staff and pupils have their own items that are not shared. Classroom based resources, such as books and games, can be used and shared within the bubble; these should be cleaned regularly, along with all frequently touched surfaces. Resources that are shared between classes or bubbles, such as sports, art and science equipment should be cleaned frequently and meticulously and always between bubbles, or rotated to allow them to be left unused and out of reach for a period of 48 hours (72 hours for plastics) between use by different bubbles.</p>	<p>For PE children will be expected to come to the school in their PE kit for the day. All PE equipment will be cleaned after each use. PE lessons will take place outside.</p> <p>Classrooms are cleared but the essential equipment. Children are encouraged to bring in their own individual resources (pencil case, pencils, erasers, etc.).</p> <p>Where shared resources are required, they will be cleaned after each use.</p> <p>For wrap around care children will be in bubbles and therefore reducing sharing of resources.</p>
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	<p>Pupils must limit the amount of equipment they bring into school each day, to essentials such as lunch boxes, hats, coats, books, stationery and mobile phones. Bags are allowed. Pupils and teachers can take books and other shared resources home, although unnecessary sharing should be avoided, especially where this does not contribute to pupil education and development. Similar rules on hand cleaning, cleaning of the resources and rotation should apply to these resources.</p> <p>Homework and coursework: where feasible, instead of submitting physical copies of their work, consider asking students to submit written homework and coursework online.</p> <p>Outdoor Playground Equipment: Outdoor playground equipment should be more frequently cleaned. This would also apply to resources used inside and outside by wraparound care providers.</p> <p>Signage, posters and training: posters encouraging social distancing and the importance of maintaining hygiene levels must be displayed around the school.</p>	<p>We will encourage children to bring only essential items to the school.</p> <p>All children have access to Google Classroom and work will be uploaded by the teachers and then uploaded by children.</p> <p>Posters and signs are placed strategically around the school premises.</p>
<p>Plan the school level response should someone fall ill on site (in line with relevant government guidance).</p> <p>Make arrangements for the very small number of cases where personal protective equipment (PPE) supplies will be needed: if your staff</p>	<p>Isolation room: schools must identify a suitable room (preferably not one used for lessons) which can be converted into an isolation room, if the need arises. The room should be used if a pupil or staff member develops symptoms associated with Covid-19 (a new, continuous cough or a high temperature, or has a loss of, or change in, their normal sense of taste or smell (anosmia)). The room must be capable of accommodating up to three people at any one time whilst 2m social distancing is maintained and if possible, should include openable windows (to help with ventilation). As a minimum, the room must be equipped with a first-aid kit, bottled drinking water, PPE and hand sanitiser.</p>	<p>Isolation room has been identified but the room only can take up 2 people. It is envisaged that these would be siblings. In the event of multiple cases, we would take the children outside to our veranda.</p> <p>Isolation room will be cleaned after each suspected case.</p>

	<p>Temperature checking: Public Health England is clear that routinely taking the temperature of pupils is not recommended as this is an unreliable method for identifying coronavirus (COVID-19). However, if temperature checking is deemed necessary, non-contact, infrared forehead thermometers should be used.</p>	<p>Temperature will be checked if pupils or staff members feel unwell. Non-contact forehead thermometers are available.</p>
	<p>PPE - when it is required: personal protective equipment should be stocked and should only be needed in the following scenarios:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • supporting those suspected of having Covid-19 where maintaining a distance of 2-metres is not possible or that either the patient or supervising adult wishes to wear it. • staff members required to support any student with their mobility around school and a distance of two metres cannot be maintained. 	<p>PPE equipment is available in school – this includes gloves, masks, aprons and visors as well as cleaning equipment and hand sanitiser.</p> <p>Charlotte is in charge of ensuring that we don't run out and to order more.</p>
	<p>PPE - what items are required: should PPE be required; the following items should be provided to staff members;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • a fluid-resistant surgical face-mask • A visor (to further protect from bodily fluids) • disposable gloves • disposable aprons <p>These items are considered single-use and must be securely placed in a general waste bin (not a recycling bin) when no longer required.</p>	<p>PPE equipment, as listed, is available in school.</p>
	<p>Protocol for when the incident is over: schools should follow their normal incident reporting process. In addition to the enhanced cleaning schedule, any items used by the patient prior to being taken ill must be cleaned as quickly as possible. If this is not possible, items should be removed from use until the scheduled clean can be completed (or quarantined for 72hrs).</p> <p>All PPE worn by the supervising adult must be securely placed in a general</p>	<p>All procedures opposite will be adhered to.</p> <p>Jo Ryan will be the appointed person.</p>

	<p>waste bin (not a recycling bin) and thorough hand washing must be completed before continuing with their duties.</p> <p>Schools must obtain an update on the individuals health, ensuring that Government guidance regarding testing and self-isolation is adhered to.</p> <p>If someone tests negative: if someone tests negative, if they feel well and no longer have symptoms similar to coronavirus (COVID-19), they can stop self-isolating. They could still have another virus, such as a cold or flu – in which case it is still best to avoid contact with other people until they are better. Other members of their household can stop self-isolating.</p> <p>If someone tests positive: if someone tests positive, they must continue to self-isolate for at least 10 days from the onset of their symptoms and then return to school only if they do not have symptoms other than cough or loss of sense of smell/taste. This is because a cough or anosmia can last for several weeks once the infection has gone. The 10-day period starts from the day when they first became ill. If they still have a high temperature, they should keep self-isolating until their temperature returns to normal. Other members of their household should continue self-isolating for the full 10 days.</p> <p>All results must be communicated to your Education Director/EET.</p> <p>Manage confirmed cases of coronavirus (COVID-19) amongst the school community: in addition to notifying Sheila McKenzie and your Education Director, you must take swift action when you become aware that someone who has attended has tested positive for coronavirus (COVID-19) having developed symptoms and taken a PCR test outside of school.</p> <p>You must send home those people who have been in close contact with the person who has tested positive, advising them to self-isolate immediately and</p>

Household members of those contacts who are sent home do not need to self-isolate themselves unless the pupil or staff member who is self-isolating subsequently develops symptoms, unless they have been told to self-isolate by NHS Test and Trace or their public health protection team, in which case they must self-isolate. If someone in a class or group that has been asked to self-isolate develops symptoms themselves within the 10 days from the day after contact with the individual who tested positive, they should follow guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus (COVID-19) infection. 	<p>Building checks prior to reopening: It is important that, prior to fully reopening, all the usual pre-term building checks are undertaken to make the school safe. Any recommendations for flushing, chlorination, etc. must be undertaken before reopening.
